OUR WORK: PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS

Mapping & modelling resources

Compiling visual 'heat maps' of sea lice, particulate waste and dissolved nutrients from 144 open net fish farms to empower communities to challenge new farm applications and existing farm extensions.

Highland primary schools birdboxes project

Supplying 10 bespoke birdboxes and tailored teaching packs to all 175 primary schools in highland region, providing valuable nesting habitat for native birds and inspiring the next generation of nature champions.

UN Sustainable Development Goals

West Loch Ness Farm cluster project

Supporting the first farm cluster in Scotland, seven farms and one forestry commission site, to manage their land collaboratively benefiting wildlife and increasing biodiversity.









Guardians of our rivers Funding the creation and training of four citizen science groups to monitor the health of river flies as a benchmark for the health of the rivers where they are found.
